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Hoocak Academy graduates first class of Pathway Program students

On Monday, April 25, the Hoocak Academy celebrated the first class completion of students in its Pathway Program language class at the House of Wellness in Baraboo, Wisconsin. Students and Language Division staff shared a meal and presented recognition awards, language t-shirts and wristbands for the occasion.

The Pathway Program language class began on February 2 with a total of 20 students. The last class met on April 12 with 7 students making it through the entire course. The Pathway Program was a nine week course.

The students being recognized from the Pathway Program Ho-Chunk Gaming Wisconsin Dells noon hour class were Ashley Funmaker, Jenel Hanson, Sheridan Cloud, Kristin White Eagle, Kayree Funmaker, Kelly Jo Funmaker, and Tyrone Cloud.

"It is an amazing day. You guys went through the whole thing. There were ups and downs," said Pathway

Program Manager Angelica Greendeer.

The community language classes of the Pathway Program were designed to teach language in a structured language learning environment. Hoocak Academy offered the Pathway Program, Pathway Accelerated Program, and Direct Response Sessions. The Pathway Accelerated Program is a 12 week course, and the Direct Response Sessions are Program tutoring sessions.

"Some of you are wondering what's going to happen after this. The Hoocak Academy is launching the Summer Independent Study Program throughout the month of June. We'll have online videos with language lessons. Each week we'll email you a lesson. On Thursday of that week, email you a quiz."

Student can meet with their instructor for one-on-one teaching, said Greendeer.

The Summer Independent Study Program will be a refresher course on the same units of study that the class studied, like the alphabet, family, names, and numbers.

The celebration also included a screening of new educational documentary titled, Living the Ho-Chunk Language: the People of the Big Voice. The video was co-produced by the Native American Student Association of Madison West High School, the Ho-Chunk Language Division. The video features interviews with Ho-Chunk Language Division staff and video from language camps.

Students received an award of recognition for their class completion. The award included the message, "With every Hoocak word you learn, the journey continues to becoming a

Hoocak speaker." It also included their English and Hoocak name.

"What did you guys think of the video? What did you like about it? Everything? It covered a lot," said Greendeer.

Greendeer talked about conducting the class for the summer months online. The language division doesn't have enough staff to offer classes through summer.

"Some are still ask what I have to do after this. Your work starts out of the classroom. Some of the high school students ask that same question. Say more things outside of the classroom," said Greendeer.

The language students were presented with black long sleeved t-shirts with the Hoocak Academy logo on it, and a Hoocak Academy red wrist band.

"We wanted you guys to have the t-shirts and wrist bands so you can identify other language class students when you go about your day. You can know who to speak Hoocak to," said Greendeer.

Other Hoocak Academy classes completed in other Ho-Chunk communities, such as Tomah and Black River Falls. Tomah's class completion will be held on Wednesday, April 27, and Black River Falls will hold their class completion on Thursday, April 28.

"We've never had proficiency standards before. This is something new but we need to try it and go from there," said Greendeer.

"We are headed in the right direction."

Hocak Worak maintains its journalistic integrity

In a few instances in recent months, the Hocak Worak has been questioned about its journalism. Like many comedians will point out to hecklers, "I don't come to your workplace and harass you while you're working." Or as I overheard my 10 year old say to his sister, "If you're pointing your finger at me, there are three fingers pointing back at you." But we are ready to hear and answer any questions people have. After all, we can't write our stories without listening.

First and foremost, we always give you the option to write your own story, the way you want it to be told. When

we offer that to folks, they are usually happy to have us write it for them. We are a limited staff and can't cover all of the happenings of the Ho-Chunk Nation. So when people call our office to let us know about an event, we are always happy to cover the event. We do require 2 to 3 days' notice so we can work out logistics of covering an event. But feel free to write about events in your neighborhood.

In news gathering, we always go to the source of the news. One issue we face within the tribal government constructs is approval from the "higher ups". Managers and directors want to be sure their staff doesn't say anything that's incorrect about news

from within their department. The Hocak Worak staff trusts that people being interviewed are the source of the story and speak factually and honestly about an event or news. We have no interest in skewing any story of the Ho-Chunk Nation.

We also face the issue of tribal members not wanting to share their story because they don't want to make themselves appear too proud or conceited. Culturally, Ho-Chunk don't want to be viewed as someone important or special, but want to remain humble. We have many Ho-Chunk that excel in various facets of today's world. What we hope to capture is the spirit of following your dreams

and achieving your goals. Our children are watching and learn from the ones they look up to. We want to highlight the good positive role models.

The Hocak Worak has always made space available for Letters to the Editor. Letters are to allow people to speak their minds, but it can't contain libel. The Ho-Chunk Constitution protects our freedom of speech and of the press. Our leaders take an oath to defend our rights. The Hocak Worak prides itself for being the voice of the people. Without our voices, our peo-

ple are powerless. The Hocak Worak is essentially our only source of public record and only news media source of the Ho-Chunk Nation.

At the core of each of our stories is the Ho-Chunk people. Our tribal government is the social force that affects our daily lives. We want to recognize all our people, culture, government, businesses and employees' history and advancements. We want our readers to feel empowered and have a sense of pride through the information and stories we write.

From the desk of Vice President Darren Brinegar:

Greetings Tribal Members,

We are in the midst of wrapping up budget season which should be around mid-May. Things are going well for us during this process and we are keeping very busy.

The Ho-Chunk Nation supported the Application for the Higher Education Scholarship Program, Johnson O'Malley Program, Indian Child Welfare Program and the Native Youth Culture Fund for Ho-Chunk Nation Museum Digital Storytelling Pilot Project in the April Legislative Meetings.

The Ho-Chunk Nation has entered into Memorandum of Understandings (MOU) with the University of Wisconsin-Madison: Native American Center for Health Professions.

The HCN Tribal Enrollment and Membership Code is out for a 45 day comment period.

The Ho-Chunk Nation has made donations to the School District of Black River Falls, Red Shawl Gala and The 2/4 Marine Association. Gaming compact donations have been approved for the Wittenberg Fire Department and Area Ambulance Services and the Village of Eland.

Whirling Thunder has been

selected as the future site of the Kijire Nagu Healing Center Campus. The workgroup reviewed all of the Nation properties and selected Whirling Thunder as the future site.

Per Capita was declared at the April 12th Legislative Meeting. There will be a distribution on May 1, 2016.

There were 4 appointments made to the Wazee Wastewater Commission which include Pine Giroux, Rob Voss, Sheri Zank and Katie Funmaker. Representative Shelby Visintin was appointed to the Audit Committee.

There was an update on proposed legislation AB620 which said that it failed to pass pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution 1. The Ho-Chunk Nation Legislature would like to thank everyone that was involved in helping to defeat this legislation. We would like to thank all of the Tribes of Wisconsin and the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska for your support in opposition and at the Save The Mounds Rally. Great Job!!! Save the Mounds!!!!

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Garvin hopes to create Ho-Chunk Nation Veterans Registry

Ho-Chunk Veterans Service Officer Margaret "Muggs" Garvin wants to honor all Ho-Chunk veterans by listing them in a published registry.

Her idea came from a similar veteran registry in Jackson County, which lists all the veterans of the county, along with their pictures, in bound books.

Now she hopes to do the same for all Ho-Chunk veterans.

"The purpose of the Ho-Chunk veteran's registry is to help preserve the memories of the past, present and future veterans with Ho-Chunk ancestry," Garvin said.

"While collecting information from the living veterans and families, the Division of Veterans Affairs will be able offer services which will help the veterans obtain their benefits," she said.

Garvin plans to run some of the biographies in the Hocak Worak to highlight their service to the country and to provide examples for other veterans so that they can submit their information.

There will be a cash drawing of \$300, \$200 and \$100 after the first 200 stories have been collected. Veterans can either write their own stories, or come in the office to provide information so that

Garvin can write the biographies.

Robert Anthony Mudd (RAM) was born on November 11, 1948 in Black River Falls, WI. His parents were Ben and Ethelene Free Youngthunder.

He joined the United States Army on September 30, 1966. He was only 17 when he joined. Since he was only 17 his parents signed for him to join. He didn't like school very much and wanted to join the armed forces. His dad was a major influence on this decision since he served in both WWII and Korea.

Robert was a paratrooper

and served with the 101st Airborne Division (Screaming Eagles). He did a tour and a half in Vietnam. He was awarded the Bronze Star. Robert was discharged on June 12, 1969. He extended 6 months to get an early out of the service.

He has three children: the twins – Robert and Roxanne and Alexander.

He lives in the Indian Mission - Black River Falls, WI.



Kathy Ann (Stacy) DeCamp was born on October 22, 1959 in Mauston, WI to Martin and Caroline (Whitewing) Stacy. Kathy is the granddaughter of "Mountain Wolf Woman" – Stella Blowsnake Stacy. Her father Martin Stacy hailed from the Black River Falls area and grew up in the Indian Mission. Her mother Caroline was from the Wittenberg area.

Kathy joined the United States Army in July 1980 and

was discharged December 1989. Kathy attended AIT at Fort Benjamin Harrison, IN. She was a 71D, then a 73C. She was a stenographer but eventually switched to a Finance and Accounting Specialist. She served during the Grenada conflict. While on active duty she was stationed in Korea and Germany.


Kathy also served in the Army National Guard immediately following her active duty time, which makes her total service time 12 years. Kathy was discharged from the US Army as an SGT (E-5) in December of 1989, and later discharged from the Army National Guard as an SSG (E-6) January 1992.

The most enjoyable time in the military for her was visiting Camp Red Cloud while in Korea, and she also enjoyed traveling around the world. She stated, "If given the opportunity, I wouldn't change a thing and I highly recommend our young people join the military service."

Before being discharged he was awarded the Bronze Star. Doug was discharged as a Sgt (E-5) from USMCAS El Toro, Santa Ana, CA, and returned back to Wisconsin. He lived in Black River Falls, Milwaukee and currently lives in Black River Falls, WI.

He is the father to 4 children, 2 daughters and 2 sons.

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‘Take Back the Night’ spreads the message about sexual assault

Four tee shirts moved back and forth in the gentle breeze. Their messages of hurt and anguish were printed on their surfaces with ink, which seeped deeply into the fabric.

But there were other words as well – words of hope and healing, of sacrifice and renewal, were also exhibited, overcoming the words of so much pain. The gentle breeze carried those words into the wind, taking them to the air above, to be taken away and dispersed to beyond.

Those shirts were on display at the “Take Back the Night” event on Thursday, April 21, at the Lunda Park Shelter, provided by the girls from Bolton Refuge sexual assault group. They represented their thoughts and feelings about their ordeal directly afterward and how they felt about the ordeal moving forward.

It was an event to raise awareness and demand the right to move freely about their homes and the communities without the fear of sexual violence.

The Ho-Chunk Nation Domestic Abuse Division, in collaboration with the Bolton Refuge and the Jackson County Outreach program, coordinated the event.

The event began with an opening drum and prayer, with a meal that followed. Several members of the groups spoke about their role in the prevention and healing of domestic abuse, along with a reading of statistics of sexual

abuse by Domestic Abuse Survivor Advocate Rebecca Triggs of Ho-Chunk Nation Social Services.

Members of a biker group, “Bikers Against Child Abuse,” attended, with a member of the group speaking before the audience and explaining their role in preventing childhood sexual abuse and raising money for the cause.

Officers of law enforcement also spoke about their roles, including Black River Falls Police Chief Scot Eisenhauer.

A walk was planned from the shelter to the Jackson County Courthouse, but inclement weather prevented the walk.

“The whole reason in planning our event ‘Taking Back the Community’ is to get awareness out to the community about Sexual Assault and how common it is,” said Ariana Youngthunder, Domestic Abuse Division Coordinator with Ho-Chunk Nation Social Services. “Also to let people know about our Division, Domestic Abuse - that we are here to help whether it be domestic abuse or sexual assault situations. We appreciate all those in support of us and our Division’s purpose.”

“We decided to do the ‘Take Back the Night’ event for several reasons,” said Ho-Chunk Nation Social Services Domestic Abuse Division Director Samantha North. “Obviously, the main reason was to get the maximum exposure – so people can see us taking action and standing up and speaking out.

“But also, ‘Take Back the Night’ events have been going on for decades,” North said. “They started out on college campuses where the stranger rapes were happening at night and the events were for survivors to speak out and it was mostly women. But as times change, so does the movement to end sexual assault. We’ve realized that it happens to people of all ages, all sexes, it happens by strangers and acquaintances and close family members and it happens in other places than college campuses, obviously, and during the day.”

Throughout the years there’s been a change of what they’re raising awareness for and what they’re realizing and learning along the way is that it affects everyone, whether it’s daytime or nighttime, she said.

“In today’s day and age, I thought it would be a good idea to bring back the ‘Take Back the Night’ event for the whole entire community and raise awareness that way,” North said. “Hopefully, and even though it doesn’t just happen at night and it’s not just strangers. Hopefully we did send the message that sexual assault is preventable, it is not to be tolerated, and we need to talk about it to start the effort to eliminate it.”

“The reason for great events, as ‘Take Back the Night’, are to bring people together and show our community how these issues play such a large role in all our lives,” Triggs said.

“It is important for all of us to come together and show our support for one another

and address these issues as a whole. The more awareness we bring to our communities the bigger impact we can make in people’s lives and to show our support to the victims,” Triggs said. We need to

show victims that they are not alone and we are here to help them. We are so thankful for all the support that everyone has shown our Division and we have such high hopes for the future.”

Spring Produce

Spring is finally here! And along with the warm sunshine comes the first fresh fruits and vegetables of the season. How good a fresh spinach salad will taste, or that first ripe strawberry! Perhaps you know someone who has rhubarb growing in their yard, or are even lucky enough to have it yourself.

Take the opportunity this spring to take a child or grandchild out to show them the rhubarb growing out in

your yard, and tell them about the way you used to eat it; or perhaps a better fit for your family is to go strawberry picking at a pick-your-own place. Another idea is to take your children or grandchildren to a local farmer's market, when it opens in your area, to see the variety of fruits and vegetables offered there. Let them pick something out, and ask the farmer the best way to prepare it. Have fun experimenting with this new healthy food, cooking together, and making memories.



Xaa'wisku (Rhubarb) Sauce

This rhubarb sauce is sweet but tangy! It is delicious by itself, with a scoop of low fat vanilla ice cream, or as a sauce for a lean pork roast. See if a friend has an unused rhubarb plant in their yard and will give you some stalks, or better yet, see if they will give you a chunk of the plant! Rhubarb grows easily in your yard and comes back year after year! Caution: do not eat the leaves, they are toxic.



3 cups chopped rhubarb (fresh or if frozen, measure while frozen)

1/3 cup orange juice

1/3 cup sugar or granulated artificial sweetener (or 8 packets sweetener of choice added at the end of cooking)

1 Tablespoon apple cider vinegar

Simmer all ingredients together in a saucepan until thick. Makes about 6 servings for a low calorie treat! With sugar: 68 calories, 17 g. carbohydrate; with artificial sweetener: 28 calories, 6 g. carbohydrate.

EAB found in Stevens Point; Portage and Wood Counties to be quarantined

Portage and Wood counties will be quarantined for emerald ash borer, following discovery of the tree-killing pest in Stevens Point.

"Not only is it likely that EAB is present in Wood County at low levels that are difficult to detect, but historic patterns of wood movement into the county, and the fact that it is a wood utilization center, make it practical to quarantine it along with Portage County," said Brian Kuhn, director of the Plant

Industry Bureau in the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. The bureau

administers plant pest quarantines. "Mills there will be able to move wood in freely from other quarantined counties. They will still have to meet regulations for moving wood products that could carry EAB out of the county to non-quarantined areas."

Stevens Point residents noticed and reported woodpeckers activity on ash trees, which is one of the primary signs of EAB infestation. The woodpeckers are eating EAB larvae from under the bark. City foresters collected larvae, or immature beetles, from two ash trees and also found typical EAB damage – tunneling under the bark and D-shaped

holes in the bark where adult beetles emerged.

Quarantines prohibit ash wood products and hardwood firewood from being moved to areas that are not quarantined. For businesses handling wood products that could carry EAB, this means that they must work with DATCP to assure that they are not transporting the pest to non-quarantine counties. For private citizens, a quarantine means that residents may not take firewood from these counties to nonquarantine counties.

"We strongly discourage moving firewood even within quarantine areas," Kuhn said. "The vast majority of EAB

infestations have resulted from the movement of firewood, as evidenced by the number of times our first find in a given county has been in campgrounds. Most of the quarantined counties are not generally infested, so moving firewood within them could bring the pest to new areas in the county that would otherwise remain uninfested for several years."

Kuhn notes that other forest pests and diseases also move easily and invisibly from one location to another under the bark of firewood.

DATCP recommends that property owners who have ash trees in quarantine counties:

- Keep a close watch for possible signs of EAB infestation: Thinning canopy, D-shaped holes in the bark, cracked bark, branches sprouting low on the trunk, and woodpeckers pulling at bark.

- Consider preventive treatments if your property is within 15 miles of a known infestation.

- Consider planting different species of trees that are not susceptible to EAB.

- Call a professional arborist, and visit emeraldashborer.wi.gov for detailed information.

Emerald ash borer is native to China and probably entered the United States on packing material, showing up first in Michigan in 2002. It was first found in Wisconsin in 2008 in Ozaukee County.

Other quarantined Wisconsin counties are Adams, Brown, Buffalo, Calumet, Columbia, Crawford, Dane, Dodge, Door, Douglas, Fond du Lac, Grant, Green, Iowa, Jackson, Jefferson, Juneau, Kenosha, Kewaunee, La Crosse, Lafayette, Manitowoc, Marquette, Milwaukee, Monroe, Oneida, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Racine, Richland, Rock, Sauk, Sheboygan, Trempealeau, Vernon, Walworth, Washington, Waukesha and Winnebago.

EAB adults lay eggs on the bark of ash trees in mid- to late summer. When the eggs hatch a week or two later, the larvae burrow under the bark for the winter and feed, forming the characteristic S-shaped tunnels and destroying the tree's ability to take up nutrients and water. The following summer, the adults emerge through D-shaped holes in the bark.

The Wisconsin Emerald Ash Borer Program includes DATCP; DNR; UW-Madison; UW-Extension; USDA Forest Service and Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

Nekoosa schools bring in Ho-Chunk culture to enlighten the people

It began with an idea by an AmeriCorps volunteer to connect the Ho-Chunk people and culture with non-natives.

It grew into an event called "Nekoosa Culture Event 2016," a program that brought Ho-Chunk identity for everyone to experience.

That event was held on Monday, April 11, at Alexander Middle School during school hours and at the Nekoosa High School that evening.

Karen Redcloud, Tribal AmeriCorps representative, said it started about seven months ago when she was looking for a way to bring about more exposure to the Ho-Chunk culture.

"There seems to be a disconnect – a curiosity about the Ho-Chunk culture. People are asking questions," Redcloud said. "This seemed to be a good fit to get information about the Ho-Chunk Nation out there."

Redcloud met with a group of teachers and Nekoosa School District Administrator Terry Witmore, who all welcomed the opportunity to bring a better understanding among people.

"We've been meeting monthly to see how we can bring about a better relationship and work together

with the Ho-Chunk Nation," Whitmore said. The Nekoosa School District currently has a Ho-Chunk charter school in which students can learn the language and culture along with other standard school topics.

"We're striving to break down the barriers of the past and how to work together in the future," Whitmore said. The Ho-Chunk people are living in two worlds, their own culture, plus the world of non-natives, he said.

"We're excited about the Culture Committee," he said. "We're looking to advertise so that people can be getting to the powwows."

When the group was formulating ideas, a group of teachers came to Black River Falls to tour the Ho-Chunk Nation facilities to get a better understanding of the Nation.

The Culture Event can be considered part of Act 31, where the schools implement programs to educate students and public about the local indigenous people, Whitmore said.

Angeline Decorah, interim center director of the Nekoosa Youth and Learning Center, has been a part of the Culture Planning Committee and she

said the effort has been to work toward integrating Act 31 into the classrooms.

To help with that effort, students and teachers from Port Edwards came to attend and participate in the Nekoosa Culture Event at the Alexander Middle School.

The lessons given for fourth- and fifth-grade students were about black ash basket making, frybread making, kinship and clans, moccasins games, bandolier bags and regalia presentation.

In the evening event at the High School, the event began

with a meal of traditional Ho-Chunk food and a thank-you song in the cafeteria. The event continued in the auditorium beginning with a welcome by Karen Redcloud. A student introduction was given by ninth-grade student Isaac Decorah, followed by dances being described and introduced by master-of-ceremonies Dillon Prescott.

"What makes it even more wonderful is that a majority of the dancers were Ho-Chunk high school students," Decorah said.

LOOK WHAT OUR KIDS ARE UP TO

Our 118 children have been exploring the rain forest and animals galore! They have also been exploring all about the color purple, the oval shape, the number 12, the letters f, q and w, the opposites of long and short, and the ever important value of kindness! In the spirit of the season, they learned all about tractors, wagons and bikes as means of transportation!

With the changing of the season, of course our kiddo's love to get outside and expend some of the energy they have been saving up during the winter months!! We have to take extra precaution to make sure that our outdoor play areas are safe and free of hazards at all times, just as we do with the interior areas of the Centers. Because our outdoor play areas are often the areas of choice for our neighborhood children to play in on off school hours, we want to thank you all for taking good care of them. Sadly, in one of our areas, the children have not been so fortunate. Their picnic table was turned upside down and all of the screws that secure the benches were removed; rendering it unusable. We have to thank our friendly maintenance folks for their abilities to get it bent back into shape and reattaching the benches, so the children can use it again. Thank you maintenance for saving us \$1,000 dollars! Additionally, a section of fencing that keeps our children in safe zones was completely taken down and flattened out. I would like to thank my son for giving up his weekend to help his momma make sure that the area was once again secure. He spent an afternoon, pulling the fence back up and reattaching it...saving us approximately \$1,500. Thank you George, momma loves you!

SPECIAL EVENTS

Field trips to explore "for real" the concepts we are learning.

As a part of our transition activities (transition from Head Start to the big school), our children will be visiting the schools they will be attending, meeting the Teachers and the Principals, experiencing the playgrounds, visiting the libraries and classrooms, and having lunch. The lunch time at the big school can be very stressful for our children, as they have experience with family style meal service, and they have to adapt to the "lunch line" concept. As a part of our transition activities, parents will be asked if they wish for us to release any information to the big school. If so, they will be completing the necessary paperwork for that release.

A program wide event occurred...the Federal Office of Head Start visited our program the week of April 11, for the review and evaluation of the environmental health and safety of our program. We will have the written report of

compliance, or issues we need to address within 8-10 weeks, however the preliminary outcome is as follows:

We will be having a Classroom Assessment Scoring System review by the Office of Head Start in 2017; however it has not yet been scheduled.

We will additionally be having a review of the Child and Adult Care Food Program by USDA, May 3 and 4. The results will be shared when they become available.

Last, but certainly not least, we are recruiting for next year, and have already received many applications for enrollment. PLEASE contact us, so we can meet with you to complete an application for your child!

WHAT'S NEW IN HEALTH AND NUTRITION

Recently, I had the opportunity to speak to a fine young man about his memories of Head Start and what's been happening since. I would like to say, that as we chatted, I was taken by his respectful nature and humble spirit.

This young man graduated from Head Start in 1982, and headed off to the big school in Black River Falls, where he attended until he graduated in 1995. Speaking of "graduation", a smile appeared on his face as he recalled his graduation from Head Start! "I remember walking to the mini Pow-wow grounds in the Mission, right there across the street from the basketball court. 

Steindorf family trek to China, take a jog on the Great Wall

Ho-Chunk member and employee John Steindorf saw an opportunity of a lifetime, so he took it.

He was looking for a destination to take a vacation and, when he stumbled upon a trip to China for a great price, he couldn't pass it up.

Steindorf and his wife, Beth, and two children, William and Olivia, flew to Beijing, China, from March 20 to March 27.

The flight was long, taking almost 11 hours from Seattle to Beijing on a Chinese airline named Hanan.

"It was like walking into the 1960s," he said. "The stewardesses were very curious and polite. They wore uniforms with hats and provided us with two meals and snacks and drinks and free movies."

Steindorf said the adjustment to the time change was difficult, which was 12 hours from the time in Wisconsin. Also, there was a form of culture shock in realizing the huge number of people in the city.

"There are 23 million people living in Beijing," he said. "Traffic was always congested, no matter what time of day." A lot of the traf-

fic on the streets were electric scooters. Also shocking was the amount of freedom people had, the same as in the United States, which is contrary to what we have been led to believe.

"Everyone has a job, and if they didn't have a job and was physically unable to work, they would receive a pension." He was surprised, when entering a retail store, how many clerks were available to help the customers.

Some of the sites they visited included Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, the Great Wall of China, the Emperors Summer Palace, the Temple of Heaven, a pearl and jade factory, a rickshaw tour in Hutong, the Marco Polo Bridge and the Olympic Village.

Throughout the whole tour, they were guided by an interpreter who had attended college, but had learned to speak English by watching the television show, "Sex and the City," Steindorf said.

The Steindorf's first visits, on the first day, was to Tiananmen Square and the Forbidden City, which were across the street from each other. When asked about the demonstrations and killings that happened in Tiananmen Square, their tour guide said she had no knowledge of the event.

The next day they went to the Summer Palace, which was built for emperors to live during the summer months. It also had a story of the "Dragon Lady," a queen who had imprisoned her nephew in a portion of the palace because she wanted to prevent him from inheriting the throne.

The next site they visited was the Temple of Heaven. It was a structure that was built for the emperor's father. He wanted to give it to him before his father died. Everything in it was created in series of nines: there were nine stories, nine arches, nine walkway, nine windows, etc. At the end of the day's tour, they were given a ride on a

dragon boat.

On the third day, the Steindorf family visited the Great Wall of China. For the most part, the steps along the top of the wall are steep and uneven, making walking sometimes difficult.

"I found a level portion to jog, just so I could say I jogged on the Great Wall of China," Steindorf said.

They also went to the Ming Tombs, where 13 emperors are buried.

In the next days, they visited a pearl and jade factory, where they polished the gems and put them into jewelry and ornaments. They also visited a silk factory, where silk garments were made from silk threads produced by silk worms. Bringing home some of the jade, pearl and silk items were important to them, so they visited the street marketplace, where it was crowded and vendors had their wares on display and available for purchase.

"I found out that bargaining with the sellers was commonplace, so I soon learned that he could get an item cheaper than the original asking price," Steindorf said.

"I would offer a price and if he or she said 'no,' I would start to walk away and they would come after me and say 'okay.'"

The rickshaw ride in Hutong, a subdivision of Beijing was a treat, followed by an evening meal at a private residence.

"The food was excellent," he said. "It is so fresh and much better than the Chinese food served in the U.S."

The next place they visited was the Marco Polo Bridge, which also serves as a monument to an armed conflict that happened many years ago, he said. In 1937, Japan invade China and the bridge still displays the bullet holes and craters that were created during that invasion.

"The local people were amazed that we went to see the bridge, because it isn't something most tourists go to

see," Steindorf said.

The "Birds Nest" was one of the attractions at the Olympic Village for the 2008 Olympic Games, and the Steindorf family visited the site on one of the last days in the country.

At the conclusion of their stay, tour staff picked them up at the hotel and took them to the airport as a courtesy.

"They were very polite and considerate. They picked us up at the airport when we arrived and dropped us off when we were to leave. And every day they would pick us up at our hotel and provide the transportation to our destination," he said. "They drove us wherever we wanted to go."

They were surprised on how well developed the city is, with department stores and even America chain restaurants, such as KFC.

Overall, the whole experience was eye-opening and something they are glad they did.

Their son, William, originally was dismayed that they chose China as a vacation spot, wanting to go to Brazil instead. But once there, he began to change his mind and was glad that they had gone.

"We loved it," Steindorf said. "It was a once in a lifetime experience. We probably won't ever have the chance to do it again."



BURN PIT REGISTRY INFO

In 2014, VA launched the Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Registry for Veterans and Servicemembers who were exposed to open air burn pits at military sites in Iraq and Afghanistan. It contains health information collected from thousands of Veterans and active duty Servicemembers who completed a questionnaire online. VA is studying the health of exposed Veterans and Servicemembers through the Burn Pit Registry and other research efforts.

If you are a Veteran or Servicemember who served in eligible locations you can participate in the Burn Pit Registry.

Even if you do not have any current symptoms, VA encourages you to take part.

Here's what you need to know about the Burn Pit Registry:

1. The Burn Pit Registry tells VA about your exposures. By completing an online questionnaire, Veterans and Servicemembers can use the Burn Pit Registry to report their exposures and related health concerns, and to document their health. As the long-term effects of exposure to airborne hazards during service are still relatively unknown, documenting exposures early ensures that participants will be monitored over time and that VA can improve programs to provide the necessary health care and resources should any health problems emerge. Burn Pit Registry Key Findings (click image to see full infographic)

2. The registry provides a summary of your health for you and your health care providers. The Burn Pit Registry helps participants to become more aware of their own health and allows them to receive updates about ongoing VA studies and treatments. It also helps researchers to study the health effects of burn pits and other airborne hazards, resulting in better long-term health care from VA for current and future Veterans and Servicemembers. Those who are eligible can get an optional, no-cost, in-person medical evaluation.

3. Many Veterans who deployed after 1990 are eligible to join the registry. VA uses deployment information from the Department of Defense (DoD) to determine eligibility for the Burn Pit Registry. To be eligible, you must be a Veteran or Servicemember who served in the Southwest Asia theater of operations at any time on or after August 2, 1990, or Afghanistan or Djibouti on or after September 11, 2001. This includes the following countries, bodies of water, and the airspace above these locations:

Iraq - Afghanistan - Kuwait - Saudi Arabia - Bahrain - Djibouti - Gulf of Aden - Gulf of Oman - Oman - Qatar - United Arab Emirates - Waters of the Persian Gulf, Arabian Sea, and Red Sea

4. Sign up for the Burn Pit Registry in three easy steps. To sign up for the Burn Pit Registry, visit <https://veteran.mobilehealth.va.gov/AHBurnPitRegistry>.

Step 1: Make sure you have a DoD Self-Service Level 2 Logon (Premium DS Logon Level 2) account. If you don't already have one, you can apply for a DS Logon account at <https://myaccess.dmdc.osd.mil>. While a Premium DS Logon Level 2 account is required to access the registry at this time, VA is exploring other ways to access the registry website in the future.

Step 2: Complete and submit the online questionnaire. The questionnaire takes about 40 minutes to complete. You can complete it all at once, or log out and return later.

Step 3: Print and save your completed questionnaire for your records. You can use your completed questionnaire when talking to a health care provider about your exposures.

5. Technical support is available for the registry. Call the Registry Help Desk at 1-877-470-5947 from 8 AM to 8 PM Eastern Standard Time Monday through Friday to get questions answered and for help with any technical problems you might experience while registering. 


