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Joshua Decorah Sanford to be inducted into the Wisconsin Aviation Hall of Fame

Captain Joshua Decorah Sanford will be inducted into the Wisconsin Aviation Hall of Fame on October 20, 2018, in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Joshua Sanford was the only Native American that flew for the famed Flying Tigers and survived World War II.

Sanford was born near Friendship, Wisconsin on January 19, 1919, to Maude L. Decorah and Herbert W. Sanford. His mother was Ho-Chunk. His father was a Seneca from Cayuga County, New York and a graduate of Cornell University. They divorced while Joshua was still quite young.

Sanford grew up in the Richland Center area and was an active young man, participating in sports, mowing lawns, and shoveling snow. Richland Center is less than ten miles from Lone Rock, where the Civil Aeronautics Agency had an emergency field for airlines traveling

between Chicago and Minneapolis. The field staffed a Flight Service Station and was a junction of mail routes used by airmail carriers in the early 1920s.


Tomas J. Thomas, President of the Wisconsin Aviation Hall of Fame board, wrote in 2007 Forward in Flight Magazine, "This would have brought a fair amount of airplane activity near Joshua's home. That area near the Wisconsin River was also frequented by Bald Eagles that would soar on the thermals of the hills along the river and watch for fish or other game that might serve as a meal. It's easy to put these two things together to take a young person's dreams aloft."

Joshua Decorah Sanford graduated from Viroqua High School in 1936 and then entered the University of Wisconsin - Madison. Before he completed his education there, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps on November 4, 1940. He was selected for pilot training.

Tomas J. Thomas wrote,

"As anyone who has attended military pilot training knows, only those with excellent health, highly honed pilot skills and consistent performance are chosen to fly fighter aircraft. Fighter pilots are alone in the cockpit and must be able to think and perform independently. That means flying the aircraft yourself when the weather turns sour and performing as a team player in combat. A fighter pilot is by himself in the cockpit on every sortie and their life is in their hands, they alone control their destiny. Fighter aircraft didn't have autopilots, requiring the pilots to always be in control of their aircraft."

Sanford was commissioned a Second Lieutenant and awarded his wings January 1943. His first assignment out of pilot training was to the 14th Army Air Corps Flying Tigers under General Claire Chennault's command in China. Joshua Sanford was attached to the 75th Fighter Squadron, 23rd Fighter Group. The original

All Volunteer Group (AVG) Flying Tigers were disbanded on July 4, 1942. The 14th Army Air Corps was assigned the China Theatre and carried on with the AVG Flying Tigers' mission.

According to Tomas J. Thomas' November 2, 2001 presentation in Baraboo, Wisconsin, The Mission of the 14th Air Force was to: (1) Defend its own lifelines over the Hump; (2) Ferret out and destroy Japanese aircraft and troop concentrations; (3) Destroy the enemy's military and naval installations in China; (4) Smash and disrupt Japanese shipping along the China coast and beyond and on the numerous inland waterways in China; (5) Destroy enemy supplies and military installations in Indochina, Thailand, Burma and Formosa; and (6) Encourage Chinese

resistance and provide all possible aerial support to their ground forces.

Joshua Sanford was affectionately called "Chief" by the men who served by his side. Fighter pilots start

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Golden Sands RC&D hosts annual Waupaca County Conservation Field Day Event at Hartman Creek State Park

The annual Waupaca County Conservation Field Day will be held on September 28th, 2018 at Hartman Creek State Park. The event is being coordinated by Golden Sands Resource Conservation and Development Council, Inc. About 377 Waupaca County 5th grade students will attend the event from Waupaca Middle School, Manawa Elementary School, Emanuel Lutheran, Marion and Clintonville Middle School. Additional sponsors are being sought to ensure the event continues in the future.

The Field Day event offers students 20 hands-on field stations, each highlighting a different conservation concept or career. Field stations offer a wide variety of topics including aquatic insects, learning to compost, conservation law enforcement, soils, agriculture, wildlife, forestry, wetlands,

geo-caching and more. The students spend the day at the park, rotating through stations and will also have the oppor-

tunity to explore the forested trails in the Park as they take a

mid-day hike during the lunch break. A field journal is provided for students to record their experiences and observations from the event.

Field stations are facilitated by local natural resource professionals who volunteer their time from organizations including the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), Golden Sands RC&D, Quantum Dairy, Waupaca County Solid Waste & Recycling, Waupaca County Land and Water Conservation Department (LWCD), Friends of Hartman Creek State Park and UW-Extension.

This is the 12th year Golden Sands RC&D is coordinating the event. Waupaca County LWCD hosted it for over 20 years before that. The event is sponsored by the Waupaca County LWCD, Friends of Hartman Creek State Park, Pheasants Forever Tomorrow River Chapter, Parfreyville United Methodist Church and the Waupaca County Chapter

NAJA Board unanimously elects Tristan Ahtone president; Bryan Pollard joins staff as director of programs and strategic partnerships

NORMAN, Oklahoma -- Bryan Pollard (Cherokee) resigned his seat on the Native American Journalists Association Board of Directors on Aug. 29, after being elected to a third term as president in July 2018.

Pollard will join NAJA in the new full-time staff position of director of programs and strategic partnerships, where he will oversee programming including annual conference training, awards, the Native American Journalism Fellowship (NAJF) and the RED Press Initiative.

He will also be responsible for developing partnerships and assisting with fundraising, in accordance with the organization's 2018-2020 strategic plan.

Pollard joins NAJA after serving as the communications director and AmeriCorps VISTA Coordinator at the Indigenous Food and Agriculture Initiative at the University of Arkansas. Prior to joining the U of A, he was executive editor of the Cherokee Phoenix, the tribal news me-

dia for the Cherokee Nation based in Tahlequah, Oklahoma. The Phoenix was the first Native American newspaper originally published in 1828. He is also a founder of Street Roots, a nonprofit newspaper focused on issues of concern to the homeless and low-income citizens of Portland, Oregon.

Pollard has served as a mentor for numerous journalism organizations including the Oklahoma Institute for Diversity in Journalism, the Society of Professional Journalists, Working Press, UNITY News, Online News Association, NAJF and NAJA's Project Phoenix. He is currently pursuing a master's in journalism with an emphasis on documentary filmmaking.

The NAJA Board unanimously elected Tristan Ahtone (Kiowa) to fill the vacant president seat during the monthly meeting Aug. 30.

Ahtone is a citizen of the Kiowa Tribe of Oklahoma, a lifetime NAJA member and associate editor for tribal affairs at High Country News. His stories have won multiple honors, including investigative awards from Public Radio

News Directors Incorporated and the Gannett Foundation. He is a graduate of the Institute of American Indian Arts and Columbia School of Journalism. In 2017 Ahtone was awarded a Nieman Fellowship to study at Harvard University.

"I am truly honored and excited to serve as NAJA president," said Ahtone. "We want to continue to provide support for Native journalists, and promote the amazing work our membership does - to ensure the highest standards of journalism and advocate for principles in line with our own unique traditions, outlooks and worldviews."

Ahtone has served two previous terms on the board of directors and was elected to a third term during the National Native Media Conference in July 2018.

Upon being elected as president, Ahtone appointed Sterling Cospers (Muscogee Creek) to fill Pollard's vacancy on the board.

Cospers is the current manager of Mvskoke Media, an independent news outlet of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. He started as a reporter for

the Muscogee Nation News in 2012 and was promoted to editor the following year. With key support of the news staff, he successfully advocated for the passage of free press law, during an ongoing series of high-profile events involving the tribal government.

As manager, he has focused on restructuring the department, while optimizing the financial independence of Mvskoke Media to be a powerful advocate for Mvskoke citizens. He will continue pushing for free press protections in Indian Country through his service on the NAJA Free Press Committee.

Cospers is a citizen of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation of Oklahoma and a current board member of the Oklahoma Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists.

The remaining officers and members will continue to serve the board for the duration of their elected terms.

Ho-Chunk Gaming Black River Falls opens long awaited Porte Cochere, and Veteran's Memorial Garden

Another phase of the Ho-Chunk Nation's "Project Forward" at Ho-Chunk Gaming Black River Falls has been completed. On Friday, August 24, 2018 a ribbon cutting ceremony took place for our Thunderbird inspired Porte Cochere and Veteran's Memorial Garden.

Porte Cochere is a French word for coach gate, used to protect people from the

weather elements. Ours is unique in its physical size and appealing structure. The conical feature has lights inside that are beamed upward through blue acrylic, and downward to an organic sand based rock garden. The surrounding secondary walls of the Porte Cochere have multiple lights directed toward their panels that create a multi-colored effect in the evening.

The Veteran's Memorial Garden is an offset from the

Porte Cochere on the south east hotel side of the facility. It was designed as a peaceful, and respectable area with five illuminated flags and a plaque giving tribute to some of the Ho-Chunk Nation's fallen service members. Benches, trees and shrubs have also been added to give serenity to

the area. Ho-Chunk Gaming Black River Falls has undergone major renovations and expansion over nearly two years, with ground breaking on September 23, 2016. Completed phases include: gaming floor expansion with 200 additional slots (including a non-smok-

ing section, and high-limits room), brand new hotel and lobby, renovated buffet and bistro, and now the Porte Cochere and Veteran's Memorial Garden. The Bingo Hall is nearing completion of their renovation, and ATV parking with a wash bay coming in 2019.

as wingmen and those that perform well are moved up to a flight lead. Sanford moved up to flight lead and a story from one of his wingmen, Ed "Smokey" Bollen, appears in 2007 Forward in Flight Magazine reads:

"We were on alert, me assigned as No. 2 in Chief's four-ship flight. The weather was lousy, low clouds and drizzling. But along the morning came orders to go. A Jap cavalry column was moving south and threatening the Chinese defenders of Changsha.

We took off carrying .50-caliber ammo and parafrag bombs, all but standard for anti-personnel missions. We tried to form up in a finger-four pattern, but the clouds were too low. Chief was following the river northward and having to do lots of twisting and turning to stay in its course: there were hills on both sides reaching into the clouds. We just stayed in line astern.

Up past Changsha, Chief suddenly headed inland away from the river. I was appalled. The 'road' we had been briefed to follow was nothing but a path of stepping stones, common in Central China. And the weather wasn't getting better.

Chief hung to that footpath like a bird dog. I thought he was nuts, just wasting time and gas, but I wasn't about to say anything. We had to thread the needle through several passes, the clouds down almost to the ground. I couldn't imagine how Chief could stay with that footpath and be sure it was the right one. It was all we do to just stay with him.

After twenty or thirty minutes I was getting disgusted. We hadn't seen a sign of the enemy activity and getting further into weather trouble by the minute. But suddenly we topped one last low pass – and there they were! It was mounted troop of horse cavalry, caught absolutely flat footed.

We came upon them so suddenly that Chief didn't have room to fire. He just dropped his parafrags among the panicking horses and pulled off. I got in a firing pass, dropped my bombs, and followed Chief around for a second pass. ... There weren't enough men or horses left alive to justify another pass, so we headed back down our footpath. Thanks to the river, getting home was no problem. But in that 2 1/2 hour mission we never got over about 300'. ... I never flew with another man who could navigate that China countryside like the Chief. ... He was a true Tiger, a colorful and effective combat pilot and to me a good and valued friend."

Joshua Sanford flew 102 combat missions between 1942 and 1945, awarded two Distinguished Flying Crosses, two Air Medals, two Purple Hearts, five campaign rib-

bons, and Presidential and unit citations. He believed to have shot down eight enemy aircraft and official record documents one confirmed kill. Joshua was shot down or ditched 12 times. He flew North American T-6 Texan, Curtiss P-40 Warhawk, and North American P-51 Mustang.

After the war, Joshua completed his education in electronics and was employed by Hallicrafters Corporation in Chicago. He married Rosemary Bertz on June 21, 1948. According to the book Reedsburg Remembers 150 Years, Joshua's wife said, "Josh didn't like to talk about his war experiences and chose never to shoot a gun again. He had seen too much killing."

Joshua Decorah Sanford's focus turned to his Ho-Chunk Nation people and fought for their rights.

The Indian Reorganization Act of June 18, 1934, was a United States federal legislation aimed at restoring to Native Americans the management of their assets. The main goal was to reverse assimilation into American society and to strengthen, encourage, and perpetuate tribes. Twelve years later, the government passed the Indian Claims Commission Act. This sought to compensate tribes for claims they had against the U.S. government.

The Wisconsin Winnebago (now Ho-Chunk Nation) formed a claims committee in 1949. This committee would become the seed for current Ho-Chunk Nation government. According to an article by Helen Miner Miller, appearing in issue 2 of 2012 Hockak Worak, this claims committee included LaVern Carrimon, Nathaniel Decorah, Robinson Johnson, Joshua Sanford, and Reverend Mitchell Whiterabbit.

At a General Council meeting in 1961 in Tomah, Wisconsin, the provisional Wisconsin Winnebago Business Committee added Richard Day, Lyle Greendeer, Angelo LaMere, Gilbert Lowe, May WhiteEagle Natani, James S. Smoke, Bernadine Tallmadge, Floyd WhiteEagle, and Helen Miner Miller to the five who served on the claims committee.

Sanford returned to Hillsboro and owned an electronics firm. He then moved to Reedsburg in 1956 and managed the Wisconsin Municipal Airport there. Then he was appointed Civil Defense Director for an 11-county area of Southwestern Wisconsin in August of 1961.

Joshua Decorah Sanford died on October 21, 1962. He was age 43. Acknowledgment of his accomplishments wouldn't end there.

Thirty years after World War II, China awarded the Flying Tigers the China War Memorial Medal. Joshua Sanford received his posthumously.

In his honor, the Hillsboro community named its airport 'The Captain Joshua Sanford

Airport'. According to Phil Peterson's article titled 'A Final Salute to Joshua Sanford Field, Hillsboro, Wisconsin', local Hillsboro resident, Richard Sweeney, was instrumental in getting the airport named this in 1993.

A paragraph was written by the Honorary Civilian Chaplain Betty Blackstone for the Hillsboro Airport Dedication Ceremony and reads:

"It is altogether fitting that he be so remembered, for he represents those young men of his generation whose ideals were above and beyond the earthbound – whose hearts were tuned to hidden music, whose courage and daring outdistanced pessimism and fear. They climbed the airwaves and set new records because they dared to try. These were giants in those days"

In 2016, a brick commemorating the memory of Joshua Sanford is dedicated at the Memorial Wall next to the EAA AirVenture Museum in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Joshua Sanford is one of four aviators that will be inducted into the Wisconsin Aviation Hall of Fame on Saturday, October 20, 2018. According to WisconsinAviationHallofFame.org website, Jerome LeBarron, Janis Sierra, Joshua Sanford, and Donald Winkler will be honored at the induction ceremony for their significant contributions to aviation in Wisconsin.

The induction ceremony will be held at the EAA Aviation Museum in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Inductees' family, friends, and the public are invited to attend.

Division Director of Youth Services Lanette Walker places an emphasis on the word "prevention" when she talks about the upcoming "Prevent Suicide Conference" slated for September 21-23, at the Siga Funmaker Community Center in Wittenberg.

"We want to be proactive, rather than reactive," Walker said. "We want to be ahead of it."

The upcoming conference is geared toward the youth, but it also includes adults and community members. "Because it's part of the community. You can't make one plan and expect it to fit all. Every situation is unique."

For the Prevent Suicide Conference on Sept. 21-23, speakers will be Nikki Lowe, a former MMA fighter; Dr. Iris Prettypaint who will speak on preparedness; and Dr. Don Bartlette, who will speak on community readiness. Waylon Pahona is slated to be the guest master-of-ceremonies.

September is Suicide Prevention Month.

The conference will be a collaboration of many departments and divisions within the Ho-Chunk Nation. Helping conduct the event will be Youth Services, Pac Haci Youth Council, Behavioral Health, Community Supportive Services, and the Pac Haci community members.

At previous conferences,

the youth identified five factors that play into the reasons behind thoughts of suicide. They are:

1. Bullying
2. An identity crisis
3. Domestic violence
4. Alcohol and drugs
5. A general lack of leadership in their lives to lead them and give them direction

Based off those five identifiers, they put the conference together.

It all started in 2011, when a directive was given to create a community action plan on suicide prevention.

In 2012, youth gathered to say how they might address the subject and how they organize a yearly meeting of sort, not always a conference, to raise awareness and provide more education to those people who might be affected.

During the first year of the effort, several Ho-Chunk youth ran in the Fox Cities Marathon Relay. They were there to run with Dirk Whitebreast and to support his cause.

Whitebreast ran 10 marathons in 30 days in honor of his sister who completed suicide at the age of 18. The effort was to promote his own healing and to raise awareness of suicide.

"Our paths crossed when we were supposed to," Walker said.

At the upcoming conference, part of the philosophy they will be using is QPR,

which is an acronym for Question, Persuade, and Respond.

Another philosophy is called "ASIST" which will be provided to attendees by Ho-Chunk Behavioral Health therapists.

Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) is an intensive, interactive, and practice-dominated course designed to help caregivers recognize and review risk, and intervene to prevent the immediate risk of suicide. It is by far the most widely used, acclaimed and researched suicide intervention training workshop in the world.

Community Supportive Services also will play a role, as well. Members of that group will provide sessions on coping skills, such as using art therapy to express themselves.

First time for the conference is the "Honoring Veterans and PTSD" in a small ceremony this year, Walker said.

"We're taking direction from the youth," Walker said. "They identified what needs to be addressed."

Friday night is the cultural activities and Saturday is the information day, with speakers and a corn roast at night with an outdoor movie and a bonfire. Sunday is an awareness walk/run. The walk will be through the community.

"There's something for everyone," Walker said. "We're trying to keep everything free so more people will partici-

pate and cost won't be a barrier to participation."

The Pac Haci Youth Council has put a lot of effort into the conference, conducting fundraisers to help pay for the costs.

"Prevention is important," Walker said.

Lodging is available for attendees at the Ho-Chunk

Gaming – Wittenberg Hotel and the Best Western, along with camping sites.

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Ho-Chunk musician performs at Twin Cities fundraiser, interviewed on television

Corey Rae White, guitarist and vocalist, performed with his band, "Lonesome Losers," at the annual "Pulling Together" fundraiser on Saturday, Sept. 8, in the Twin Cities.

Before that happened, he and his band members appeared on WCCO Channel 4 television for an interview to promote the event and to perform on Friday, Sept. 7.

The fundraiser involved a "tug-of-war" competition

across the Mississippi River with teams from St. Paul competing against teams from Minneapolis. Corey and his band played at the after-party following the "tug-of-war" competition and awards ceremony.

As it currently stands, St. Paul teams have raised \$77,258 while Minneapolis teams have raised \$69,735 for a combined total of \$146,993. The money raised will go toward the Fraser Special Needs Bright Futures, experts

in children with special needs and autism.

"It was amazing," Corey said.

Corey's band, Lonesome Losers, is a band that plays music termed as "Yacht Rock." Corey describes the type of soft rock from the Time/Life music collections of the 70s and 80s.

"We played a big outdoor festival a couple weeks ago and a bunch of the newscasters from the CBS station was there. Of all eight bands that played that day, they went back to their news station and wanted the Lonesome Loser band," Corey said.

"So, they contacted me and then I made sure the band members were available," he said. "First off, I was like holy cow, the most-watched television station in the Twin Cities wants us to play an event. Then I looked at the event and realized it benefitted Fraser, to which I wrote a reply email saying, 'Hey, it really hits home with me. I love the fact that it's benefiting Fraser and anything I can do above and beyond to help.' They asked me to do interviews, and then they asked for the band to come in to perform the Morn-

ing Show the day before the event."

When Corey was done being interviewed and the band was playing in the studio, all the newscasters were holding up their cell phones and recording them performing, he said.

Corey's son, Jesse, now 10, went to Fraser for a few years and has improved considerably because of the help he received, he said.

"It was amazing, first off, to be approached by an organization of that size. And, second off, the fact it benefitted an organization that has done great things for my family, just made it all the better," Corey said.

According to the producer of the event, the band did such a good job, he wants the Lonesome Losers to be the entertainment every year.

"It's a very specific type of music and there's no one else that does it. My guys can really play and it's not the kind of music you hear from bar bands. It's a show - it's five-part harmony, it's big orchestration," Corey said.

"These songs are hard to play and it's taken us several months to practice to get them

down. It's a big undertaking and it's risky in the sense that no one's really doing it," he said. "People picture going to a bar and banging their heads and jumping around to hip-hop music and this is not that. This is smooth love songs with grooves. It's music I heard as a kid and always been in my head."

Part of the performance is the comedy, he said. That's why they dress up like sailors. It's about fun.

"Part of this is people will make fun of you if you're singing a love song by Christopher Cross out loud. Also, part of the attraction of coming to the show is you can do that freely and loudly - we're all doing it. We're creating a community of yacht rockers," Corey said.

During the live broadcast of the Pulling Together event, WCCO reporters interviewed Corey on the beach of the Mississippi River.

"I ended up talking to them in my bright suit," he said. "It was fun."

The Lonesome Losers are scheduled to perform at Ho-Chunk Gaming - Black River Falls in January.

Otoe-Missouria Nation presents the Ho-Chunk Nation with a sacred horse

During the historic 2018 Ho-Chunk Nation Labor Day Pow-Wow, our relatives from the Otoe-Missouria Nation came "HOME" in droves to meet their ancestral relatives in Black River Falls, Wisconsin.

Along with the formal introductions by the leaders of the Ho-Chunk Nation, singing, dancing, meals sponsored by families and clans, storytelling, and extravagant

traditional giveaways, was a deeper, more serious gift: they brought with them a sacred gift of life, a Palomino Paint Stallion.

At two years old, this special horse, nicknamed "Otoe", has a gleaming coat of gold and calm brown eyes. He is quiet and likes to listen and watch others. He stands tall and strong, straight and piercing. He is a symbol of the enduring struggle that the Otoe-Missouria have endured to survive removals and

transplants to foreign lands, and their long-awaited dream to once again return home to the motherland in Wisconsin. He represents the realignment of two, now-flourishing tribes that once existed as one, before colonization when sickness and wars divided us. Most importantly, he is a symbol of healing, and all that is sacred, from an era when we once gave our most prized possessions to others to promote humility and gratitude. Historically, the sacrifice of a sacred horse as a gift to another was once considered one of the greatest gifts that one could give. Many elders recollected such horse giveaways in the past from the 1930s to the 1980s and then such giveaways, rare nowadays, almost disappeared until recently. About nine years ago, a Menominee tribal member gave Traditional Chief Clayton Winneshiek a paint stallion at the Black River Falls Pow-Wow.

Presently, "Otoe" awaits a formal naming by the Ho-



Chunk Nation. In the meantime, he is leisurely growing and being gently trained daily with care and love as he matures into adulthood. It is with the utmost gratitude that the Ho-Chunk Nation thanks Mr. Dennis "Punkin"

Black of the Otoe-Missouria Nation, Mr. Wilson Pipestem for presenting the Ho-Chunk Nation with such a blessing of life and the freedom that this horse represents.
