Line 5 Contested Case Hearing Draws Hundreds to Ashland

On August 12, nearly 200 people crowded into the conference room at Northwood Technical College as the contested case hearing over Enbridge's Line 5 pipeline reroute

The opening day featured hours of legal arguments and public testimony, setting the tone for a high-stakes battle over Wisconsin's wetlands, waterways, and tribal sovereignty.

The Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, joined by Clean Wisconsin and several environmental organizations, is challenging permits issued by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

They argue the DNR's approvals for the 41-mile reroute fail to comply with state law and ignore the environmental and cultural risks tied to the project.

Earthjustice Senior Attorney Stefanie Tsosie, representing the Band, told the court that the pipeline threatens not just water resources, but the very homeland of the Anishinaabe people.

"The Bad River Band has been a steward of this land, the surrounding waters, wetlands, and rivers, including Mashkiiziibi herself, and Anishinaabeg-Gichigami for hundreds of years. In English, those would be the Bad River and Lake Superior," she

She explained that the Band would show how the project lacked adequate baseline data and that construction methods such as trenching, blasting, and horizontal drilling would cause lasting damage.

"If something happens to this region, the Band has nowhere else to go, it's the Band's homeland," she added.

Clean Wisconsin attorney Evan Feinauer placed the dispute in a broader context, pointing out that Wisconsin has already paid the price for wetland loss through flooding, habitat destruction, and degraded water quality.

"Our past failures create an obligation to preserve what we can for future generations," Feinauer said.

Feinauer stressed that although the state has groundwater and wetlands standards in place, they mean little if not enforced consistently.

"An oil spill of any meaningful size could be catastrophic. Such a spill is far from outlandish given the proposed route's geology, steep slopes, erodible soils, and numerous other risks," Feinauer said.

The DNR defended its process, saying it had conducted one of the most comprehensive environmental Continued on Page 7

Families Gather for Cultural Wisdom and Personal Growth at Ho-Chunk Nation's Fifth Annual Family Healing Camp

Despite the August heat, families from across the Ho-Chunk Nation came together August 5–7 at the Andrew Blackhawk Memorial Pow-Wow Grounds for the Fifth Annual Family Healing Camp.

This year's theme, Holistic Healing Through Generations, guided the threeday gathering that blended workshops, cultural teachings, entertainment, and family time in a safe, alcohol- and drug-free space.

For Jacqueline Moen-Kadlec, Professional Support Service Supervisor, the most powerful part of the camp was watching families heal together.

"What stood out most to me was seeing families get to spend time together while learning ways to heal from past traumas," Moen-Kadlec said. "From the families and individuals who attended, to the presenters and entertainment, we hope that everyone took something away from the event that they will be able to use in their own healing journey."

Workshops and presentations highlighted cultural wisdom and personal growth, with sessions led by elder Jane Burning and educator Dr. Sonny Smart drawing especially positive feedback.

Moen-Kadlec said Burning's talk on darkness and light in healing resonated deeply, a theme later echoed in the performance of Nataani Means, creating what she called "a full circle moment."

The theme itself, Moen-Kadlec explained, grew from a desire to broaden the camp's focus.

"In 2024, the Family Healing Camp theme was, 'A safe place to learn, share and heal," Moen-Kadlec said. "For 2025, we wanted to make sure we encompassed the whole being instead of focusing on mental, physical, or spiritual healing separately.

Elders and cultural leaders played a central role, with Clan Mothers and Traditional Court members present to share their guidance.

The camp also honored Myrtle Long, founder of the Clan Mothers Program and longtime Ho-Chunk Nation Social Services employee, who received a Legislative citation during the event.

Beyond workshops and ceremonies, the camp was also about joy and togetherness. Families laughed, played, and connected across generations, reflecting the healing spirit of the gathering.

Attendance has grown each year since the camp's beginning, and Moen-Kadlec hopes that trend will continue.

"The hopes we have for future events is for attendance to continue to grow," Moen-Kadlec said. "We are open to suggestions on presenters and look forward to seeing everyone next year."

Secretarial Election Offers Voting Options

The Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board is calling an election to amend the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution. The secretarial election is scheduled for Saturday, September 20. There are mail and in-person

There are mail and in-person procedure options for eligible voters. Any enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation who is at least eighteen years old and who has resided in their respective district for at least three months is an eligible voter.

The Election Board mailed ballots on July 28 to eligible voters. The voter completes their vote and follows the instructions provided with the ballot.

The voter can return the ballot via mail or in-person to the Election Board at the annual General Council meeting on September 20. All ballots returned via mail are due to the Post Office Box by September 20 at 12:00 pm. The Election Board cannot accept ballots through interoffice mail.

The Election Board will have

a booth open for voting from 8:00 am until 7:00 pm at the annual General Council meeting, unless quorum is not achieved or if General Council adjourns before the close of polls, then the polls will close two hours after adjournment or failure to achieve quorum. Any voter still in line at close of the polls shall be allowed to vote.

The proposed amendment reads, "(e) Beginning the date this amendment is approved the Ho-Chunk Nation will permit the enrollment of persons at least 18 years old, who were enrolled in another Tribe as a minor child, to enroll with the Ho-Chunk Nation upon relinquishment of enrollment in that other tribe. The Descendant must meet all other qualifications as identified in Article II, Section 1 of the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution."

The last day to request a replacement ballot is September 10 by 4:00 pm.

The Election Board will certify elections results on Sunday, September 21.

Honoring Myrtle "Hiyugewiga" Long

Myrtle Long retires after 47 years of dedicated service to the Ho-Chunk Nation. Her legacy of compassion, cultural preservation, and strength was celebrated at different events.

On August 7, 2025, at the Fifth Annual Family Healing Camp near Black River Falls, Myrtle Long was presented with a Recognition Citation from the Ho-Chunk Nation Legislative Branch — a well-deserved tribute to her decades of service and commitment.

Myrtle's journey began in September 1978 with the Wisconsin Winnebago Business Committee (WWBC). Over 47 years, she served in Social Services, Labor, and Health, always bringing her heart, wisdom, and leadership to the Ho-Chunk Nation.

In January 2001, she founded the Clan Mothers, a program that uplifts young Ho-Chunk women through mentorship, cultural knowledge, guidance, and belonging. She invited a representative from each of our 12 clans to join her — ensuring that all voices were heard and honored.

On August 10, a surprise retirement devotional prayer services and dinner took place at the Fairchild Community Center Building in Fairchild, WI.

Myrtle has been, and will always be, an inspiration to our community.







HO-CHUNK NATION

In Honor of Myrtle Long Hįyųgewį

LET IT BE KNOWN that the Ho-Chunk Nation Legislature hereby bestows this legislative distinction, honoring the decades of service, cultural dedication, and community leadership of Myrtle Long on behalf of the Ho-Chunk People and Nation. This recognition citation is issued on August 7, 2025, at the Family Healing Camp, to commemorate and uplift her enduring contributions to the Ho-Chunk Nation.

Myrtle Long has devoted more than four decades to the wellbeing of the Ho-Chunk Nation, beginning her service in September 1978 with the WWBC/Ho-Chunk Nation Department of Health & Human Services. In 1996, she was assigned to work with at-risk Ho-Chunk youth, where her approach emphasized healing grounded in Ho-Chunk values. Seeing that young Ho-Chunk women in particular needed safe spaces for identity-building and care, she sought out ways to offer them both guidance and belonging.

With vision and determination, Myrtle played a key role in shaping what would become the Clan Mothers Panel—an intergenerational body of respected Ho-Chunk women offering cultural knowledge, emotional support, and a sense of rootedness to youth and families. In October 2000, she joined the original Development Committee, and by January 2001, the first Clan Mothers were meeting with young women regularly. Myrtle would go on to serve as the Clan Mothers Coordinator, helping the program grow in accordance with Ho-Chunk traditions and values.

Under her guidance, the Clan Mothers became a meaningful and respected presence across the Nation. They offered not only mentorship and support, but also shared teachings, ceremonial knowledge, and lived experience—helping young women reclaim their roles, responsibilities, and strength as Ho-Chunk women. The program's reach extended into departments, schools, and community agencies through cultural in-service trainings and traditional teachings.

Myrtle's work has centered around family, community, and the vital role of women in healing. Her efforts have helped revive and affirm core Ho-Chunk family practices, strengthened intergenerational ties, and brought care and belonging into homes and institutions alike.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Ho-Chunk Nation Legislature, through adoption of this Recognition Citation, honors the wisdom, dedication, and lasting service of Myrtle Long, and expresses our heartfelt gratitude for her contributions to the health, identity, and spirit of the Ho-Chunk Nation.

May her work continue to uplift our people and remain a steady presence in the life of our Nation.

Save Our Sovereignty, Part 8: Planning Next Year's Garden This Year

If there's one thing this series of articles encourages, it is to PLAN. As you bring in your harvest, take the leavings and make a compost pile that can be turned every so often throughout the late fall, winter, and early spring and worked into the soil when preparing the dirt for planting.

Tools should be carefully stored away. Clean the dirt off, oil or WD-40 joints in the hand tools. Just like a lawn mower, prepare your tiller or drag for winter storage by emptying out the gas, cleaning the parts, and storing it in a barn, shed, or garage. Store your hoses. Most don't take temperature change well, so they may be better stored in basements, but remember where you put them so you don't have to buy them again

next year!



Incidental Take Notice For Sauk County

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) proposes to issue a permit for the incidental taking of a rare lizard and terrestrial, which may result from the Winnebago Heights Development in Sauk County.

Incidental take refers to the unintentional loss of individual endangered or threatened animals or plants that does not put the species' overall population at risk.

The Ho-Chunk Nation proposes to develop multiple parcels for home construction. Temporary work areas will be established within the parcels or along roadways. Current land cover is generally unmanaged herbaceous vegetation.

The presence of the state endangered slender glass lizard is confirmed in the vicinity of the project site. DNR staff determined that the proposed project may result in the incidental taking of some lizards.

The DNR concludes that the proposed project is not likely to appreciably reduce the likelihood of the survival or recovery of the species within the state, the whole plant-animal community of which it is a part of or the habitat that is critical to its existence.

Conservation measures to minimize the adverse effect on the endangered species will be incorporated into the proposed Incidental Take

Permit. Copies of the jeopardy assessment and background information on the slender glass lizard are available by visiting the DNR Incidental Take Public Notices webpage or upon request from DNR Conservation Biologist Rori Paloski at Rori. Paloski@wisconsin.gov or 608-516-3742.

Marc Anthony James Anderson Jr., whose Ojibwe name was Gitchibenisi (Thunderbird), was born to Justina Cecile Hindsley (Ho-chunk, Menomonie, Ojibwe) and Marc Anthony James Anderson Sr. (Ojibwe) on August 6th, 2008, in Minneapolis, Minnesota; the year the Boston Celtics won the N.B.A. and Kevin Garnette got his Championship Ring! Marc lived the first two years of his life growing up with his auntie/cuui (dad's sister), Candice Lea Anderson, and his cousin's brother and sisters, Marie, Lea, Jessica, Leeroy Chosa Jr.! When Marc was born, he was adored by his nunu's, MaryJane and Jaqueline! We were all sooo excited that we finally had a boy in our family! Marc was such a playful and enjoyable baby! He learned how to talk and walk at an early age and was always asking questions!

When Marc was 3 years old, our little family moved to Wisconsin to be near our Ho-chunk people. One night, his mother was going to a ceremony, and he asked to come with her, and that was the start of something really special. Marc started sitting up and going to meetings at a really young age. When Marc was 4 years old, he was diagnosed with a severe case of leukemia that almost got the best of him! With prayers and a belief, Marc survived and was cancer-free. Marc graduated from Ho-chunk Headstart and attended elementary, middle school, and high school in Black River Falls.

Marc played basketball and baseball. He loved going fishing, riding his bike, and hanging out with his bros. And most of all Marc loved to sing and drum. Marc took a liking to the Native American Church of North America! Marc traveled to peyote ceremonies from South Dakota to Oklahoma! Often traveling with his cooka Lance Longtail, Tega Xander Decorah, his big nani Shaaa, cooka Jon Dick, and his special nini (big brother) Dontay Wolf Cleveland. Marc became such a great singer and drummer. He liked to joke, laugh, and was witty, always ready with a fast, cool comeback if someone tried to cap on him! And most of all, Mark was a great Tega/Jaji to all his nieces and nephews, especially to his son and daughter Peachy and Sully Cleveland. He loved his nunus MaryJane and Jackie, and his little brother Justin. He was protective of his siblings.

On November 17th, 2023,

Marc's leukemia came back. When Marc first got sick, he needed a donor. Luckily, his sister Jacqueline Nadine was a match. She donated her bone marrow to save his life. She did that twice with no hesitation! In March of 2024, Marc became cancer free once again. He was enjoying his life and starting to get back on track. Just shortly after becoming cancer-free, Marc's leukemia came back. Marc fought so strongly. He had a heart of gold and had more heart than any grown man! He fought until the very end with a strong belief in the great Spirit! Our hearts are broken. We are comforted knowing he's with all his relatives who have gone on, and that someday they will find a cure for Acute Monoloid Leukemia.

Marc is survived by his mommy, his daddy, his nunus, MaryJane and Jaqueline, his little brothers Justin and Kane, and his little sister Rain. His nanis/moms, Charlene, Twilight, Theresa, Tanya, and Genevieve, his cuuis (dad's sisters), Nicole and Candice Anderson. His tegas (his uncles). His grandmothers, Jackie (Curtis) Redearth and Nadine Longtail; his cooka, Charles Hindlsey; his special cookas, John and Chester Dick, and Truman Williams Jr.; his brothers and sisters, the Day, the Lightfeathers, Bass, and Cloud kids. And all of his cousin/ brothers. He is further survived by his special N.A.C. bros; King Brown, Amos "Gauthier" III, Arnell Bigjohn, and Levi Cleveland, and Eli Phillips, his special Tega Gage Dick and Andy Phillips special dad/jaji Paul Brown and Neulan Dion III, special children, Peach Lily and Sullivan King Cleveland, Darren Wayne, and Bernice Downwin.



Cecil Garvin May 12, 1943 - August 6, 2025

Waacanąžiga, Cecil Roger Garvin, Sr., began his journey home on August 6, 2025. He was born on May 12, 1943 to Francis Garvin and Ruby (Pettibone) Garvin in Black River Falls, Wisconsin, Cecil was raised "across the crick" with his parents, siblings, grandparents, teegas, naanis, and their families. He spent most of his time in the woods exploring, hunting, fishing, and developing a love for the outdoors he would keep throughout his

Upon graduating from Black River Falls High School, he attended trade school in Duluth, MN, for auto body repair. He returned to Black River Falls and worked briefly before being drafted into the United States Army. Cecil excelled as a soldier, leader, and warrior as evidenced by his selection to attend the Officer Candidate Program (OCS) whereby he was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. Always seeking greater challenges, 1st Lt Garvin entered and graduated from the John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center where he became a part of the highly selective Special Forces (Green Berets). During his Army tenure he achieved the rank of Captain, led a command of the nation's finest warriors in numerous combat operations, and demonstrated courage under fire. His selfless dedication to others made him an exemplary brother in arms. Cecil was a highly decorated veteran, and his awards and decorations include the Combat Infantryman's Badge, Vietnam service medal, Bronze Star with V device for Valor and 4 oak leaf clusters, Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, Special Forces Jump Wings, Air medal, and the Army Commendation Medal. He served three combat tours in Vietnam in various roles as a ranger battalion advisor, a senior battalion advisor in the elite 5th Special Forces Group Detachment B-52 (also known as Project Delta), and as a psychological warfare operations officer.

During his Army time, he met and married his best friend Renate with whom he would spend the rest of his life. Following his military career, they moved to the Spokane area where he served as an AODA counselor working with Native Americans in that region. They soon moved back to Wisconsin where he became active in Native American rights advocacy, including being a prominent figure in the American Indian Movement. He served in a variety of capacities with the Ho-Chunk Nation (then the Wisconsin Winnebago Business Committee), helping to write grants to seek the funding that established tribal programs and services, expanding the tribal land base, and playing a substantial role in the efforts to establish tribal enterprises, including the gaming businesses.

Cecil served as the Bison Project manager for a decade before he began working in what became his true passion, preserving the Ho-Chunk Language. Cecil served as a teacher, an eminent speaker, and a consultant for over 20 years. The impact of his work is difficult to measure, resulting in the creation of hours of recordings, large amounts of teaching materials, and linguistic and cultural information that has led to a greater understanding of not just the Hoocak language, but languages in general. He enjoyed a strong working relationship with the University of Wisconsin-Madison and in 2023 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters for his work with the Hoocak language as a vital knowledge holder, esteemed teacher, and researcher. Cecil took great pride in his language work, and took even greater pride in his apprentices and students who excelled in the language. His enduring work had an enormous impact on Hoocak language preservation efforts, and will continue to have impacts for generations to come.



Cecil enjoyed life each and every day. He was at his happiest when with family, and took extreme pride in his grandchildren. His strength, warmth, wisdom, and sense of humor will be sorely missed. We are fortunate and grateful to have had him as such a foundational part of our lives.

Cecil was preceded in death by his parents and his younger brother Elliott Garvin. He is survived by his loving wife of 58 years Renate, his older brother Larry (Sadie) Garvin, sons Robert (Holly) Garvin, Mike (Laura) Garvin, C.R. Garvin, and Henning (Kjetil) Garvin, grandchildren Ma'iingan, Haakon, Kai, Gavin, Christopher, Nathaniel, Cassandra, as well as great grandchildren, and many nieces and nephews. reviews in its history and imposed more than 200 conditions on Enbridge.

Supporters of the reroute, including labor unions and local business groups, highlighted the 700 construction jobs and \$135 million in economic activity the project could bring. They also warned that shutting down Line 5 could disrupt energy supplies and raise heating costs for Wisconsin residents.

Still, much of the public testimony was opposed. Forty-six people spoke during the opening day, many warning that the risks to water and tribal sovereignty outweigh any short-term economic benefit.

"No oil will replace the human right that is clean water," said Bad River member Gracie Waukechon. Others pointed to Enbridge's history of spills and its failure to provide detailed site-specific data about the land the pipeline would cross.

The courtroom fight is only the latest chapter in a long-running dispute between Enbridge and the Bad River Band. Built in 1953, Line 5 is a 645-mile pipeline that transports crude oil and natural gas liquids from Superior, Wisconsin, through northern Michigan, to refineries in Sarnia, Ontario.

For decades, the pipeline crossed through the Bad River Reservation under easements that eventually expired. In 2019, the Band sued Enbridge in federal court, demanding the company shut down and remove the pipeline from its lands.

A federal judge later ruled that Enbridge had been trespassing on the reservation and ordered the company to shut down the line by June 2026. The court also ordered Enbridge to pay the Band more than \$5 million in profits it made while operating unlawfully.

Both Enbridge and the Band have appealed parts of that decision, leaving the case tied up in the 7th Circuit Court of

to keep the pipeline operational by skirting the reservation. The company insists the project is safe and necessary for energy reliability in the Midwest.

Tribal leaders and environmental advocates counter that it simply shifts the risk onto other fragile ecosystems and communities.

The contested case hearing in Ashland is expected to stretch over several weeks, with additional public testimony scheduled for early September in Madison and presentations from environmental advocates, the Bad River Band, Enbridge, and the DNR continuing through the end of the month.

For the Band, the fight remains about survival and sovereignty. As Tsosie told the court, "These project impacts are not unavoidable. And they aren't acceptable under the state's wetlands and water laws."

NOTICE OF RULES OF SECRETARIAL ELECTION

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 20, 2025



Notice is hereby served to all eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation that the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board is calling an Election to amend the Constitution of the Ho-Chunk Nation,

Article XIII of the Constitution provides: "Section 1. Requirements. This Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the qualified voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation voting at an election called for that purpose by the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board, provided, that at least thirty (30) percent of those entitled to vote shall vote in such election.

Article XIII of the Constitution provides: "Section 2. Requests for a Secretarial Election. It shall be the duty of the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board to call and hold an election on any proposed amendment to this Constitution at the request of two thirds (2/3) of the entire Legislature, at the request of the General Council, or upon presentation of a petition signed by thirty (30) percent of the eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation."

Mail and in person procedures:

The Election Board will mail out ballots no later than 30 days before General Council. The Voter will mark the ballot and place it in the ballot secrecy envelope and seal it. The Voter will then place the ballot secrecy envelope inside the return envelope and seal it. The return envelope will be signed by the Voter as his or her name appears on the return envelope, and signed by a witness who is a U.S. Citizen 18 years or older along with the address of said witness, and he or she will then return it by mail to the location designated by the Election Board pursuant to Section 14.a.(2).(a), in-person to the Election Board Office or in person at the annual General Council meeting if applicable.

A voter may make a request to replace a lost ballot no later than ten (10) days before the Election. Upon the request of the voter, the Election Board will replace the lost ballot within twenty-four (24) hours by sending a new ballot by overnight shipment. The Election Board will not be held responsible for ballots which are received beyond the deadline for receipt of ballots. It will be the voter's responsibility to ensure the ballot is returned by the due date.

The Election Board will also make available the ability to vote at General Council in accordance with Section 21.e.(3). The Election Board will set up a number of voting locations in and around the location of General Council as the Board deems necessary to allow voting to occur with a reasonable wait time. Such in-person elections will be done consistent with the procedures listed in Section 13.g, j, and k of the Election Code.

Hours for voting at General Council will be from eight a.m. until seven p.m., unless quorum is not achieved or if General Council adjourns before the close of polls, then the polls will close two hours after adjournment or failure to achieve quorum, but no later than seven p.m. Any voter still in line at close of polls shall be allowed to vote.

LANGUAGE OF THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

To amend the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution, Article II, to add Section 1(e) as follows:

"(e) Beginning the date this amendment is approved the Ho-Chunk Nation will permit the enrollment of persons at least 18 years old, who were enrolled in another Tribe as a minor child, to enroll with the Ho-Chunk Nation upon relinquishment of enrollment in that other tribe. The Descendant must meet all other qualifications as identified in Article II, Section 1 of the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution."

- g. Challenges to Results; Amendments.
- (1) Challenges to the results of the Election may be made pursuant to Section 18 of this CODE.
- (2) The Election Board is not responsible for the legality or constitutionality of any amendments. If a member believes that an adopted amendment is in violation of the CONSTITUTION, or applicable federal law such as the Indian Civil Rights Act of 1968 25 USC Ch. 15, such suit will be brought against the proponent of the Amendment, either the petitioner, Legislature, or General Council.

PURSUANT TO ARTICLE XIII SEC 1 AND THE ELECTION CODE, THIRTY PERCENT (30%) OF ELIGIBLE VOTERS MUST CAST A VOTE EITHER FOR OR AGAINST THE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS FOR THE AMENDMENT TO BE VALID. IF LESS THAN 30% OF ELIGIBLE VOTERS PARTICIPATE, THE AMENDMENT SHALL BE DEEMED TO NOT PASS.

ELIGIBLE VOTERS:

Any enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation who is at least eighteen (18) years old and who has resided in their respective district for at least three (3) months. See Election Code Sec. 11 (a) (b).

ELIGIBILITY DISPUTES:

Any individual whose name does not appear on the eligible voters list can claim the right to vote by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board. Any eligible voter may challenge the eligibility of an individual's name appearing on the eligible voters list by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board

The Election Board shall rule on all written challenges to the list of eligible voters immediately after the close of the challenge period.

ELECTIONEERING:

The Election Board will make attempts to prevent electioneering on the issues of the Secretarial Elections from occurring within fifty (50) feet of the locations where voters are queued to receive their ballots, so long as those attempts do not interfere with the Board's ability to timely assist voters. Advocacy of the issues for consideration for a Secretarial Election does not carry the same concern as a candidate electioneering for their own office. Therefore, such advocacy in and of itself within fifty (50) feet of the voting location shall not be sufficient to challenge the results of a Secretarial Election.
