
On Saturday, April 26, the Ho-Chunk Nation held a special ceremony to celebrate the official designation of a memorial highway honoring tribal members who served as code talkers during World War II.

The event marked the culmination of years of research and advocacy to recognize these veterans whose contributions were once classified and largely unknown.

The newly designated "Ho-Chunk World War II Code Talkers Memorial Highway" spans Interstate 90 from the Minnesota-Wisconsin state line in La Crosse County to the intersection of I-90 and I-94 in Monroe County.

This corridor passes through the Ho-Chunk Nation's ancestral homelands and areas with significant tribal populations.

Benefits of Ho-Chunk Nation Native Prairies and Prescribed Burning

Centuries ago, fire was a natural part of Mauna's (Mother Nature's) way of taking care of native prairies, forests and wetlands. Because of that, ecosystems across the landscape depended on periodic fire events to rejuvenate growth and ensure long-term survival. Throughout the 19th century fire suppression has drastically changed, mainly due to large wildland fire events that have destroyed homes, cities and have taken people's lives. Because of that human nature has turned to suppressing wildland fires which has allowed invasive plants (weeds) to out-compete native grasses

and flowers, therefore greatly reducing native prairies across the U.S. However, if completed properly with safety as the focal point, fire is still one of the best management tools for continued invasive species control.

Throughout the past 15+ years, the Ho-Chunk Nation Department of Natural Resources has restored over 1,850 acres of native prairies on various Ho-Chunk Nation lands. These prairies provide a much needed ecosystem that supports habitat for various native and often times rare species of birds, butterflies, insects, reptiles, and many other wildlife



species. Prairies also help filter groundwater, sequester carbon and absorb a good amount of moisture during large rain events, which helps reduce flooding, erosion and unwanted runoff.

Once native prairies are prepared, planted and established, the Ho-Chunk Nation DNR follows up with prescribed burning as a management tool on a 3-4 year rotation. Why the use of fire instead of other management tools one might ask? Fire removes unwanted trees, woody shrubs along with many other invasive grassland species. It also removes the buildup of dead grasses meanwhile promoting diversity of native grasses and flowers. Fire helps reduce unwanted insects and helps with disease control. In addition, it reduces the amount of fuels that would burn, decreasing the intensity and spread of wildland fires.

Timing for burning is key! Most "cool season" invasive species are the first to develop in the early spring months, with "warm season" native plants to follow late spring and into the summer months. Therefore, prescribed burn management is generally applied in Wisconsin in the early season March 15th – May 15th This preferred timing for prescribed burns helps reduce cool season grasses and promote native species plants to grow with less competition from invasive plants. The May 15th deadline in order to protect grassland birds for the spring nesting season. Research has also shown



that mid-summer and late fall burns can be effective depending on management goals and objectives, cover type, species, and desired habitat types. The Ho-Chunk Nation DNR has performed both spring and fall burns to provide native plant and habitat diversity.

In summary, the Ho-Chunk Nation DNR hopes that this article provides you with a brief history of fire, the importance of native prairie restoration when it comes to wildlife and our natural resources along with the benefits of prescribed burning. 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Wisconsin Historical Society Breaks Ground on the New Wisconsin History Center New cultural attraction is coming to Capitol Square in 2027

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Historical Society celebrated the groundbreaking of the new Wisconsin History Center on Wednesday, April 23. The new cultural destination is rising on the site of the former state historical museum on Madison's Capitol Square. The event included remarks from State, Society and Tribal leadership before officially kicking off construction of the long-awaited history hub. A ceremonial ground blessing performed by Ho-Chunk Nation drum group, Little Priest Singers, preceded the event.

"This is a historic day for Wisconsin," said Christian Øverland, Ruth and Hartley Barker Director & CEO of the Wisconsin Historical Society. "With two decades of support from the State Legislature, the generosity of private donors, and the dedication of countless project champions, we are building more than just a museum—we are creating a place where all Wisconsinites can see themselves in history, and where connections between the past, present, and future will enrich the lives of each guest who walks through our new front door."

The Wisconsin Historical Society is collaborating with an industry-leading architectural and exhibition design team to bring the five-story, 100,000-squarefoot landmark to life. The design team is led by Wisconsin-based Continuum Architects in association with SmithGroup, as the lead designer. Ralph Appelbaum Associates, whose exhibition work includes many of the world's most recognizable cultural attractions including the United States Holocaust

Memorial Museum and London's Imperial War Museum, is designing the exhibits. Madison-based Findorff will lead the building construction, which is expected to be completed in just over two years.

"I am thrilled to be here as construction begins on a venue that will not only preserve Wisconsin's rich heritage but will also support future civic engagement, educational opportunities and economic vitality with ripple effects across Wisconsin," said Department of Administration Secretary Kathy Blumenfeld. "The Wisconsin History Center ensures that the shared history of our region remains accessible, relevant and inspiring for generations to come."

The new Wisconsin History Center is designed to double the exhibition space of the former state historical museum, which was housed in an undersized, deteriorating building that previously served as a hardware store. The new purpose-built facility will be able to meet growing visitation demandwelcoming more than 200,000 guests and 60,000 school students annuallyand deliver a dynamic venue for engaging historical exploration, community programing and statewide reach.

The Wisconsin Historical Society is stewarding the future history center under the guidance and expertise of some of the nation's leading experience designers, curators, scholars and historians, infusing insights from a wide range of community voices and perspectives, and in







consultation with Native Nations.

The sacred land we stand on here in Teejop-named for the four surrounding lakes that have sustained us since time immemorialcarries generations of stories, traditions and steadfast resilience," said President Greendeer of the Ho-Chunk Nation. "Today, we take an important step in ensuring that the stories of our ancestors continue to be preserved, honored and shared for generations to come."

The history center experience will be anchored by three core galleries that share regional stories in the context of American history, inviting guests to explore themes of civic engagement, human innovation and relationships with the land, and Wisconsin's identity in American culture. Additional spaces include a rotating community gallery, a large changing gallery that can also host traveling exhibits, communal spaces for public programming, a café, retail storefront, sensory room, and a classroom, lunchroom and multipurpose room to serve students and community groups. The center also boasts a striking fifth-floor event space and adjoining rooftop terrace designed to host a variety of public and private gatherings. Funding for the \$160.5 million project has been provided by \$112.3 million in state funds and \$48.2

million in private donations. The total private campaign goal for the project is \$66.5 million to support additional transition, opening and operating expenses, with more than \$54.1 million secured to date. The fundraising campaign was propelled by \$27.2 million in collective contributions from Jerry Frautschi and Pleasant Rowland, as well as a dozen lead donors that contributed \$1 million or more to the project, including:

Sen. Kelda Roys, Assembly Speaker Robin Vos and Senate President Mary Felzkowski were also present to celebrate the groundbreaking milestone, underscoring the longstanding bipartisan State support for the new center.

"This is an exciting moment as we launch construction on a world-class museum that will energize Wisconsin tourism, deliver economic benefits to the state and serve as a point of pride for residents across all 72 counties," said Robin Vos, Wisconsin Assembly Speaker.

While the Wisconsin History Center is being built a temporary History Maker Space located on the main level of US Bank Plaza on Capitol Square offers an interactive education space for school groups along with history center sneak peeks, a refreshed retail shop and a new lineup of public programming. The Wisconsin History Makers Tour is also traveling the state in the leadup to the opening of the new Wisconsin History Center. The tour brings history directly to communities across the state through pop-up exhibits, collection displays, author talks, special events and more. 

"Our area members were strongly urged to participate, and it was a great turnout," organizers said. "We are thankful for everyone who came out to help us plant trees and build up our community spaces."







The memory of Dixie Kay Brown will forever be etched in the hearts of her loved ones, who are left to carry forward her legacy of love, laughter, and cherished moments.


Heather Beckjorden & Leath "Digger" Lambert





official when Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers signed Senate Bill 633 into law in March 2024, now known as 2023 Wisconsin Act 216.

During the ceremony, Ho-Chunk Nation President Jon Greendeer emphasized the vital role these veterans played in the war effort.

"They provided a unique service to the United States Army and other armed forces out there to basically create a code that could not be cracked by any of our enemies or any of our attackers," Greendeer said. "They played an instrumental role and proved a value and probably saved the lives of hundreds and hundreds of men and women in service at that time."

For decades, the identities and contributions of the Ho-Chunk code talkers remained obscured due to the classified nature of their work. The effort to bring their stories to light began in earnest in 2012 when Sandy Winneshiek, then the Ho-Chunk Nation Tribal Veterans



Service Officer, discovered a 1995 memo listing seven World War II veterans as "Possible Code Talkers." Her persistent research led to the

Department of Defense officially recognizing 14 Ho-Chunk veterans as code talkers.

These 14 individuals were honored with Congressional Gold and Silver Medals in ceremonies held in Washington, D.C., and Wisconsin Dells.

The recognition not only honored their military service but also highlighted the importance of preserving the Ho-Chunk language and culture.

"This sign recognizes and acknowledges the brave history



of the Ho-Chunk Code Talkers in our shared story and history, shining a light on these individuals' tremendous lives and service for future generations to learn about, appreciate, and honor," Evers said. "Here in Wisconsin, we will choose to embrace rather than erase this history and the contributions of the Ho-Chunk Nation and its citizens."

The legislation not only names the 14 recognized code talkers but also includes provisions to honor any other unidentified Ho-Chunk World War II code talkers, ensuring that future discoveries can be appropriately acknowledged.

While the Navajo code talkers are

Native American tribes contributed to secure communications during World Wars I and II.

Tribes such as the Choctaw, Comanche, and Meskwaki also had members who served as code talkers, using their native languages to transmit unbreakable codes. These efforts were crucial in various military operations and saved countless lives.

As travelers journey along this stretch of Interstate 90, they will now encounter signs that not only mark a route but also tell a story of bravery, ingenuity, and the enduring legacy of the Ho-Chunk Nation.

A Powerful Reminder at the Fourth Annual Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women & Relatives 5K



INDIAN TRUST SETTLEMENT

Are you an Heir of an Individual Indian Money Account Holder?

\$38 MILLION IS AVAILABLE TO PAY HEIRS. THE DEADLINE TO FILE A CLAIM IS <u>JUNE 30, 2025</u>.

A \$3.4 billion dollar settlement was approved in a class action lawsuit, called *Cobell v. Salazar*, that claimed individual Indian land, funds and other assets were mismanaged by the federal government. \$38 million is available to pay heirs and awards could be significant.

A copy of a tribal, or state, or federal probate order is needed to establish whether the Settlement Administrator can pay the heir(s) directly for the estate's Settlement award.

Who is eligible?

You are eligible for a money award if you are an heir of one or more of the over 17,000 Individual Indian Money (IIM) account holders whose *Cobell* settlement awards were not distributed. You must submit a claim form with proof that you are an heir. Claim forms can be submitted online or can be downloaded and mailed to the administrator by **June 30, 2025**. - A state or tribal probate order identifying estate heirs; or
- A last will and testament approved by a probate order; or

You must act quickly. <u>The deadline to file is</u> <u>June 30, 2025</u>.

After the deadline, all remaining funds will be distributed to the Cobell Scholarship Fund, which is managed by Indigenous Education, Inc.



5. Elections, c. Primary Election and Runoff Elections.

(1) Primary Elections shall be held prior to an Election with three (3) or more candidates in order to ensure compliance with the majority vote requirement as provided for in paragraphs 1c and 1e.

(3) Any candidate who receives fifty percent (50%) plus one (1) of the total votes cast will be deemed as the winner.

Any enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation who is at least eighteen (18) years old and who has resided in their respective district for at least three (3) months. *See Election Board Code Sec.11 (c).*

REGISTRATION:

Each person seeking to vote must register at the polling place. If a person cannot write, that person must sign his/her name with a mark before two (2) witnesses. A Ho-Chunk translator will be available to assist any tribal member who requests assistance.

ELIGIBILITY DISPUTES:

Any individual whose name does not appear on the eligible voters list can claim the right to vote by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board. Any eligible voter may challenge the eligibility of an individual's name appearing on the eligible voters list by presenting a written challenge to the Election

Board. **The Election Board will rule on all written challenges to the list of eligible voters immediately after the close of the challenge period.** Section 11(c) iii. (Deadline, Friday, June 13, 2025 at 4:00pm)

ABSENTEE VOTING: A voter may vote by absentee ballot provided the Election Board receives the absentee ballot request in writing no later than Saturday, May 24, 2025 by 4:00 pm. See Election Board Code, section 13(a), i Requests MUST INCLUDE the eligible voter's name printed or typed (with signature), physical address where the ballot will be delivered (we use UPS next Day Air - UPS Next Day Air will not deliver to a P.O. Box), daytime telephone number and enrollment number.

Absentee Ballots must be received before 7:00 pm on Tuesday, June 3, 2025. Absentee ballots may be returned by overnight mail, so they may be received at the Election Board Office or the polling places prior to the close of the polls on Election Day. NOTE THAT FEDEX and UPS NEXT DAY AIR DOES NOT DELIVER IN BLACK RIVER FALLS ON SATURDAYS.

POSTING ELECTION RESULTS: The Election Board will certify

and post the official election results within three (3) days after the date of election.
